## STANDING ORDER NO.

Standing order No. 65 of 1955 and 12 of 1957 are modified as under:-

It will be desireable to have persons 2. registered in M.O.Bx, classified according to their modus operandi and this classification will be indicated en their personal files and eards. It will also be - No. 2 entered in coloumn No. 9 of R.P.M. 19. For this purpose the following types of crimes recorded in M.O.Bx. are alloted alphabets as given against each:-

1. Cheating - 95 CH

- 2. Criminal Breach of trust CB
- 3. Counterfeiting
- 4. Daeo ity
- 5. House Breaking HB
- 6. Receiving of stelen property R
- 7. Robbery RB 8. Theft T
- 8. Theft
- 9. Smuggling S
- 10. Trafficing of women & children on Inter State & Inter National basis - IT
- Each type of crime is further sub-divided as shown in Appendix 'A' and this sub-division will be indicated by the serial No. given to each of the subdivision.
- Within each sub-division serial number will be alloted to each registered person.
- 5. Thus the classification of a registered person will be the alphabet alloted for the type of crime he commits followed by the serial number of the subdivision and the serial number alloted to him in that sub-division. For example Raghumath is a person who commits cheating by borrowing and his name is entered at serial No. 31, his classification will be CH/11/31. Here CH shows - Cheating , 11 indicates sub-division borrowing (by) and 31 is the serial number at which his

name is entered in sub-division list of persons who commit cheating by borrowing .

Shankar is classified as RB/10/115. This classification will indicate that Durga Shankar committs Robbery in Railways - of passengers' belongings and his name is entered at serial number 115 in the sub-division of "Railways (from) - of passengers' belongings", as RB indicated Robbery, 10 indicates sub-division of robbery given at serial number 10 and 115 is the serial number in the sub-division of robbery where his name is entered.

7. Where there are two or more modus operandi of the same person his name will be entered under each

8. In order to allot classification a new register R.P.M. 21 is prescribed and will be maintained in all Distt. M.O.Bx. as well as in the State M.O.B. in the following preferm:

Coloumns 1, 2, 3 & 5 are self explanatory. In coloumn No. 4, all classifications, if any other than the one in which his name is entered will be mentioned. For example, one Motilal has two mlassifications as D/3/41 & HB/31/52. In this case while making entry in sub-division 3 - House (from) Dacoity at serial 41, in coloumn No. 4 the other classification viz. HB/31/52 will be entered and similarly while making entry at sub-division 31-slipping inner latch or bolt at serial

classification will be D/3/41. In this register, pages will be alloted for each type of crime mentioned in para 2 above and an index on the first page of the register will show the pages alloted to each type of crime. For example - Cheating 1 to 40 C.B.T. 43 to 56, Counterfeiting. 58 to 72 etc. Again there will be an index on the first page of each type of crime showing the pages alloted to each sub-division. For example on first page of the pages alloted to cheating the index will show - Cheating - Bogus C.I.D. or Police officers or other public servants - 3 to 8 (2) Bogus concern - page 9 to 11 etc.

each sub-division will be checked up by incharge and he will satisfy himself by physical checking that the new entries have been correctly made and new cards have been properly prepared. Also where individuals are to be removed from the record, there names are properly cressed in this register there cards are removed. He will then note the number of cards in balance at the end of the page, each month.

## 10. Record of suspected persons.

It is further ordered that M.O.Bx. will also maintain records of suspects who are suspected of committing M.O.B. offences. Such persons will be treated as registered persons and all available information will be supplied to incharge Distt. M.O.B. by the S.H.Os. The I/C Distt. M.O.B. will register them and prepare metal including R.P.M. 3. All those persons whose history sheets or personal files are maintained in the police stations will thus be registered and copies of their records will also be sent to the State M.O.B. where the persons may be operating on Inter State or

#### 11. Records of stolen property index Cards.

In future the stolen property index cards will be prepared in R.P.M. 6 for all items given in Appendix 'D' to standing order No. 12 of 1957 i.e. for Byak Bieyeles, Books, Cheques, Clothes, Currency, Documents, Electric accessories, Fire arms, Fountain pens, Jwellery, Musical instruments, Motor vehicles, Motor eyeles, Photographic goods, Sewing matchines, Silver articles, Sporting goods, Type writters and watches, by the incharge M.O.B on reciept of F.I.R. and copies thereof will be immediately sent to the State M.O.B. The cards prepared will be given Distt. serial number for which a register will be started with the following coloumns. The alphabets alloted to the Distt. will be # prefixed to this serial number which will be noted on each card, so prepared. For example all cards prepared in Kota Distt. M.O.B. will bear 'R' as its alphabet followed by the serial number on which that item has been noted in the register and will be shown as R/1, R/2, R/3 and so on.
